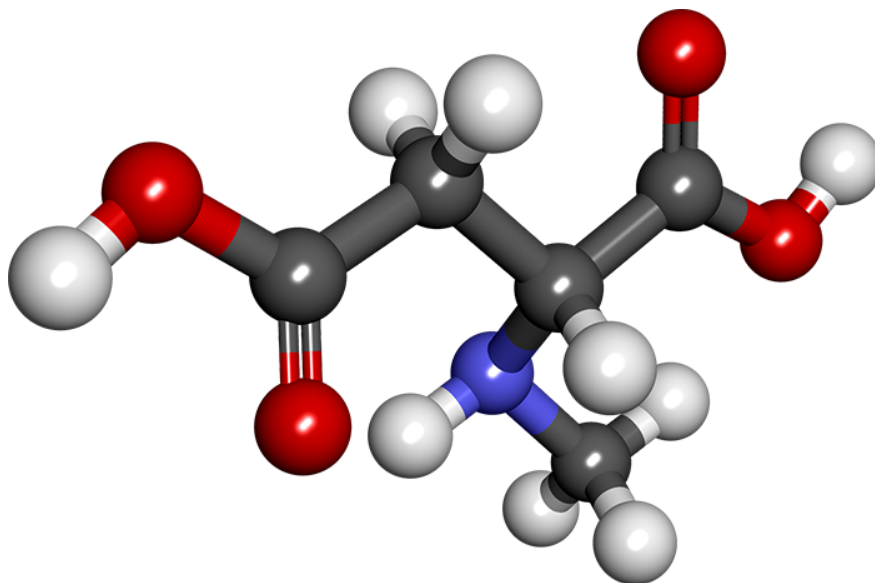


Figure 1.1: Example figure caption.

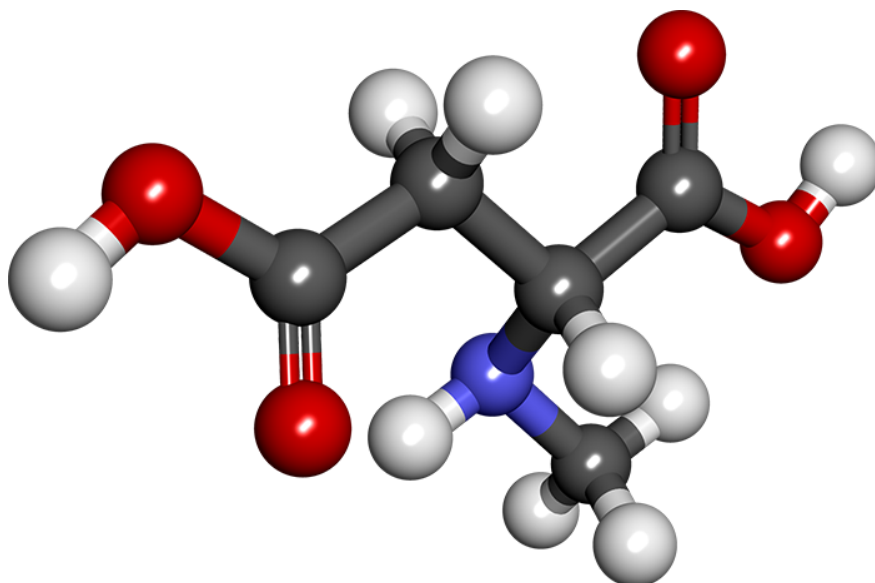
